

2022 Power Source Disclosure Program Annual Reports and Power Content Label

Recommendation:

Adopt Resolution 2023-XX approving the submission and attesting to the accuracy of SDCP's 2022 Power Source Disclosure annual reports for PowerOn and Power100 and the 2022 Power Content Label



Background:

- California Public Utilities Code requires all Load Serving Entities (LSEs) to disclose "accurate, reliable, and simple-to-understand information on the sources of energy, and the associated emissions of greenhouse gasses, that are used to provide electric services."
 - Power Source Disclosure, which is submitted to the CEC
 - ➤ Power Content Label, which will be distributed to all SDCP customers who were served in 2021 and those who have enrolled in 2022
- Requires SDCP Board attestation prior to submission to CEC and distribution to SDCP customers



Summary:

- Staff and technical consultants have vetted and verified all data
- ✓ Power 100: 50% solar, 50% wind
- ✓ PowerOn:
 - ~ 54.2% renewable
 - ~ 67% renewable/carbon free



The generation data represents energy procured during 2022 and is provided in the Annual Report to the California Energy Commission: Power Source Disclosure Program."

A portion of SDCP's energy comes from clean, large hydroelectric power stations. Under California law, large hydroelectric power stations do not qualify as eligible renewable resources.



Approval of Resource Adequacy Agreement with EnerSmart Chula Vista BESS, LLC


Recommendation:

Approve the proposed Resource Adequacy Agreement with EnerSmart Chula Vista BESS, LLC for purchase of 10 years of 3 MW of Resource Adequacy and authorize the CEO to execute the agreement.



SDCP Local Procurement Targets

- SDCP has a goal of 600 MW of local capacity by 2035
- EnerSmart has a portfolio of projects in San Diego County that in total could represent over 160MW of local standalone storage
- Chula Vista is first project expected to achieve commercial operations and SDCP will continue to engage with EnerSmart on additional projects





EnerSmart Chula Vista BESS: Overview

- Submitted under SDCP's local RFI solicitation
- 6 MWac 2-hour battery energy storage
- Project is expected to achieve commercial operation in August 2023, and is now petitioning for full capacity deliverability status with SDG&E









EnerSmart Chula Vista BESS: Key Terms

- ➤ Product: Local Resource Adequacy
- Fixed pricing for 10-year term
- ➤ Guaranteed Initial Resource Adequacy Delivery Date: 3/31/2024
- Resource Adequacy would help with SDCP's internal local procurement targets as well as external resource adequacy and mid-term reliability compliance requirements
- ➤ SDCP receives financial compensation for failure to meet certain performance requirements



EnerSmart Chula Vista BESS: Workforce Development and Community Benefits

- EnerSmart employs local labor when possible
- EnerSmart used IBEW labor for the electrical portion of the Chula Vista project
- ➤ EnerSmart projects benefit the community by providing clean energy to the grid when it's needed the most, helping to reduce the local risk of brownouts and blackouts.
- EnerSmart provides local storage reducing the need for additional transmission to import energy



EnerSmart Chula Vista BESS: Staff Analysis

- ➤ The EnerSmart Chula Vista project will contribute to SDCP's local capacity by 2035 target
- ➤ With commercial operations commencing in 2023, and FCDS expected in early 2024, the project could contribute to SDCP's compliance requirements for mid-term reliability
- Pricing is competitive with comparable product offerings received from SDCP's recent RFOs
- As a local facility developed by a local developer, this project is aligned with SDCP's goals to increase local reliability from clean energy resources and investment in our community

Approve the proposed Resource Adequacy Agreement with EnerSmart Chula Vista BESS, LLC for purchase of 10 years of 3 MW of Resource Adequacy and authorize the CEO to execute the agreement.
